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30th August 2020 John the Baptist

Dear friends, as the daylight hours shorten we continue to adapt to a new normal, which is challenging. I hope that the readings and the prayers help us feel connected with other Christians and remind us of God's presence in all situations for all time. This Sunday we mark the Beheading of John the Baptist and below are the readings, the collect for the day, a very short reflection, prayers and a blessing.

Readings: 2 Chronicles 24: 17 – 21;

Hebrews 11: 32 - 40; Mark 6: 17 - 29

Collect

God, who called Saint John the Baptist to be both in birth and death the forerunner of your Son: grant that, as he was slain for truth and justice, so we may boldly resist corruption and vice, and receive with him the unfading crown of glory; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, world without end.

Reflection:

John the Baptist is the only person apart from Jesus to be commemorated more than once during the church year and marking this particular occasion seems odd, for how do we make sense of a passage that has no redeeming features? We have a ruler – Herod who had abandoned his first wife to marry Herodias, the wife of his brother

Herod Philip. So he marries his sister-in-law. It gets worse, because Herodias' father was one of Herod's half-brothers, so Herod married a woman who was also his niece.

And there's more. Because of the very complicated familial and marital entanglements Salome was simultaneously Herod's niece and great-niece.

So is it any surprise that John the Baptist, never one to curry favour, had spoken truth to power? His target was the marriage of Herod and Herodias, which directly broke the Jewish law on marriage as laid out in Leviticus both in chapter 18 and chapter 20.

Herodias is furious, Herod, although intrigued by John, locks him up until the fateful day when he throws a birthday banquet, gets drunk to the extent that he promises Salome up to half his kingdom, something he was in no position to honour, and Herodias seizes her chance to demand John's head. Herod, too frightened to lose face in front of the very people he needed to keep him in power, caves in.

There's not much to like about that story is there? But change the details and we can see the underlying truths echoed everywhere in our modern world. Power before principles, the persecution of people who prefer principles to power, the fast and loose attitude to morality in its broadest sense.

And John died for what? His death accomplished nothing. He did nothing wrong and yet he suffered anyway. We've all heard Christians try to apply redemption to tragedy. Nothing happens unless God wants it to, God never gives anyone more than they can bear, God has a plan and so on and so on.

Maybe some people want to find redemption and hope because they find it really hard to sit with darkness and trust that God is in the darkness too.

So maybe what this story of unremitting darkness tells us is that Christianity isn't transactional, that belief in God and right living doesn't protect us from suffering and pain. The reality is some things are too hard to be dealt with by words, because they can only offer false comfort. John the Baptist's death was one of those times for Jesus. What did Jesus do?

He withdrew, he sought silence and solitude, he gave himself space to grieve, to mourn – and then he fed 5,000 people. He offered them a banquet of life, as opposed to Herod's banquet of death.

The passages from Mark and from Hebrews challenge us



to face up to one of the greatest problems that Christianity faces. Why do bad things happen to good people? I have just mentioned some Old Testament heroes of the faith, but we all know good people to whom bad things have happened.

What we can't run away from is the existence of evil. People don't like to talk about evil, it makes us uncomfortable. But it is a reality. That is why Jesus had to go the Cross – to ensure that evil does not and will not have the last word.

What John the Baptist, the characters in Hebrews, Christian martyrs have in common is that they believed that God was intent on restoring the world he created to what he originally intended. But right up to John the Baptist, they never lived to see Jesus come into His kingdom. By contrast we have, and we shouldn't take that privilege lightly.

The challenge for us is show that we are worthy of their faith, that we are willing to put ourselves at risk of persecution by standing up for what is right, by refusing to tolerate injustice, by speaking truth to power by whatever means are available to us

Thanks to Jesus, we have positive power, the power of grace and mercy, the power to love our neighbours as ourselves. It's that kind of power, not the power of evil, not the power of politics or business or military power, that will ultimately save the world.

Prayers

Lord God, we bring you our praise and thanksgiving for all your blessings. Give us the courage that John the Baptist had to call out injustice and the abuse of power and not to avert our eyes and walk the other way. May we show the grace and mercy to others that was not shown to John the Baptist. Help us to live with the mystery and sadness that bad things do happen to good people, especially in these difficult times We pray for our church leaders, especially Mark our Primus and John our Bishop. For the churches in the communities where we live and serve and for our church families of St Columba's and St Peter's.

A reminder of St Columba's opening arrangements

The church will be maintaining a 2m separation between people (unless they are buddies).

You will be required to:

- Masks must be worn and taken home for disposal
- Hand Sanitise on arrival in the vestibule area
- Give name and contact phone number on entry to the church. (The sidesperson will record it on the computer)
- Follow the sides person's instruction as to where to sit.
- At the end of the service remain seated until instructed to leave via the meeting room.
- Sanitise hand on way out (sanitiser opposite toilet doors by fire alarm).

The accessible toilet will be open but please follow the one way system and follow the instructions for sanitising before and after use.

A reminder of St Peter's opening arrangements

The following simple rules should be followed which will give all who enter the church the confidence that everything is in place to ensure their safety and well-being.

- As we all know we are a small church and have space only for 10 to allow for the necessary 2-meter distancing. To ensure that everyone is given the opportunity to come to worship at least one a month an "opt in or out" option will be offered to the congregation. This will then let us work on a schedule which will be fair to everyone. Jane Ramsay is the contact person (843176). PLEASE LET HER KNOW BY THURSDAY OF EACH WEEK
- A sides person will ensure that all hands are sanitized at the front door before entering the building. Please wait until invited into the church.
- Masks must be worn and taken home for disposal.
- Entering and leaving the building will be by the red doors only.
- You will be led back out of church by our sides person, this will be done from back to front of the church. Please wait to be invited to leave.
- Hands should be sanitized when leaving church.
- Our church has been deep cleaned and undergone a "fogging" process. The fogging will continue to be done every 30 days to ensure the building is as clean and germ free as is possible.
- Toilets and accessibility arrangements: Level access via the side door is available for those with mobility issues. A wheelchair accessible toilet is available if required and will be sanitised after use.
- Working together as we have done in the past and will continue to do now as we slowly begin to re-enter a new way of coming to church, we will keep each other and those in our community safe and well until the day comes when we gather together once more in St Peter's as one large and very happy church family.

NB If you have any symptoms (temperature, cough, loss of taste or smell) you should not attend church and you should book a test

And a reminder for St Peter's, that in order to avoid unexpected contacts, for the foreseeable future Jane Ramsay will be keeping a record of requests to enter the church. Please check with her beforehand to ensure that our little church will be empty and virus free before going in. Jane's number is 843176

Toilets at St Columba: Following comments regarding access to toilets at St Columba's from this Sunday the disabled toilet will be available. The toilet will be cleaned prior to each service but it will be the responsibility of every user to:

Sanitise hands on entering, wipe seat, lid and flushing handle before and after use with disposable wipe, wipe wash hand basin taps and door handle with disposable wipe and then sanitise hands before departing. Sanitiser solution will be wall mounted by sink, Disposable wipes to be placed in bin, **not flushed down toilet.**
