ear friends, as we continue to deal with the challenges of living with Covid 19, and also the first glimmerings of hope, I do hope that this Sunday's readings, prayers and short reflection make a connection with your lives as we celebrate the Feast of St Margaret.

Collect

A lmighty God, who called your servant Margaret to an earthly throne that she might advance your heavenly kingdom, and endued her with zeal for your Church and charity towards your people: mercifully grant that we, who commemorate her example, may be fruitful in good works

and attain to the glorious company of your saints; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, world without end.

Reflection

Today we are celebrating the Feast of St Margaret, Queen of Scotland. Pious, and a true seeker after God, even she fails to match the virtue of the wife in our Proverbs reading, who appears to be the only woman in history who embodies the modern feminist rallying cry

You can have it all. I don't think I'm best qualified to write about that subject!

Markie, my wife, has been a Christian as long as she can remember but would say that for many years she was searching for what she called a living faith. It wasn't until her mid-to-late 20s that she found what she was looking for when we were living in London and we had been worshiping for a time at Holy Trinity Brompton, the home of the Alpha course.

To me Markie is the best example I know of the pearl hunter, not least because Margaret, which Markie is short for, means pearl, a reason perhaps why this parable is offered as one of today's Gospel readings. The pearl hunter was someone who knew beauty when he saw it, but who was also convinced that there was a perfect pearl out there to be found if only he kept looking, and when he did find it, he sold everything to possess it. Equally, there are people who bump into the Kingdom of Heaven rather like the man who accidentally stumbled on the treasure, who buried it and joyfully sold all he had to buy the whole field. Some people may say he was a swindler, but finders, keepers is how Rabbinic law worked.

I like to imagine that sort of person as someone stubbing their toe on the word of God, looking down and suddenly thinking 'Oh wow, this is real, I want this even though I didn't know I did'. It's almost as if God plonked himself in their path so they couldn't miss him. It really doesn't matter whether we stumble on the Kingdom of God or intentionally search it out. It is treasure worth everything we've got, a treasure that brings immense joy. In the list in Galatians 5 of the fruit of the Spirit, joy comes second only to love. The way Jesus describes it in these two parables gives the lie to the idea that Christianity is like any other religion. The kingdom of God, reached through Jesus, is the biggest,

finest, most lustrous, most valuable pearl there is. In ancient times pearls were regarded as the very best thing that earth had to offer.

We need to respond to it like that, to treasure it, to realise that it is beyond compare. And the amazing thing is that it's a free gift. When we accept it, we realise that most of the rest of the stuff we have in our lives pales by comparison and we're better off without it. The trouble is that all that stuff, success, fame, money, possessions, whatever it is we aspire to or dream of, can look



very attractive and hard to give up. Now it may be that God doesn't require us to give up all or any of them, but we have to be ready to.

Now at a time like this the kingdom of God can seem really far away as the ravages of COVID-19 continue to wreak havoc in all sorts of ways, let alone all the other problems in the world. But the reality is that the kingdom of heaven is always closer to us than we think, even when we can't see it because it's underground or underwater - and we really need to hang on to that. Because all too often we can forget that God has deliberately and freely chosen to bless us. I find that absolutely amazing, that God has freely chosen to bless us with all our weaknesses and failings, that he has freely chosen us to be his blessing to all those people who don't yet realise that God wants to freely bless them too. That is the Gospel of hope that we have both to claim for ourselves and to offer freely to others Perhaps what these parables are saying above all is that being the unmerited recipients of God's freely given blessing really is worth everything we have, because, as Paul tells us, nothing, but nothing, not any of the awfulness happening in our world today, can separate us from the love of God - ever.

In these closing weeks of this Church Year we are in the season of Remembrance and this is one year none of us will have any problem remembering, hopefully among the memories will be some positives though – the slower pace, the kindness of strangers and so many more blessings.

Thankfully, throughout these uncertain times the life of church moves ever forward, in the church seasons for worship and in the 'holy business' of AGMs. And like so much of life our AGMs will be different this year too. Under government guidelines meetings in church are not permitted and we are getting around this by having the AGM as part of our service and so must ensure that we are very concise with our timing. We have to take it as read that everyone will have read all of the reports, either on line or in paper format, and any comments and questions sent in advance to our Vestry Secretaries – Jim Adamson for St Columba's and Catherine Fowler from St Peter's. This will enable us to comply with government guidelines that are so much part of our lives at the moment.

St Peter's AGM is coming Sunday – 15th November. Worship begins at the normal time of 9.30 and our AGM will begin around 10am. Both the service and the AGM will be available on Zoom. All of the places in church have been booked so please do join us on Zoom. May I remind you that there is one place on vestry vacant, nomination forms are available from our Vestry

Secretary Catherine and should be returned to her by Saturday please.

St Columba's AGM will be held on Sunday 29th November. It too will be part of our worship that begins at 11.15 with the AGM timed for around 11.45 and will be available on Zoom. Please do come alone either in person or via Zoom if you can, we require 20 to be quorate. Nomination forms for appointing someone to vestry are available from Jim Adamson our Vestry Secretary. We have a few vestry places available including the one being vacated by Sandra Dobson who is stepping down this year.

On Sunday 22nd November St Peter's will be having a short Family Service @ 12.30. Thank you to those who have booked seats. We are exploring if we can Zoom this service to enable those who cannot attend in person to be part of this short worship, as well as St Columba's families.

In Advent Rev Peter will be running a study based on Paula Gooder's book 'Journey to the Manger'. It will be on Zoom, making it easier for people to participate, and Peter will be trying to make it more interactive. 
A reminder of St Columba's opening arrangements. The church will be maintaining a 2m separation between people (unless they are buddies). You will be required to:

- · Wear masks and take them home for disposal
- · Hand Sanitise on arrival in the vestibule area
- · Give name and contact phone number on entry to the church. (The sides person will record it on the computer) · Follow the sides person's instruction as to where to sit. At the end of the service remain seated until instructed to leave via the meeting room.
- ·Sanitise hand on way out (sanitiser opposite toilet doors

by fire alarm). The accessible toilet will be open but please follow the one-way system and follow the instructions for sanitising before and after use.

A reminder of St Peter's opening arrangements. The following simple rules should be followed which will

give all who enter the church the confidence that everything is in place to ensure their safety and well-being. As we all know we are a small church but the moving of the organ allows us to have 14 still allowing for the necessary 2-meter distancing. Tuesday morning and Sunday morning



services are now well attended. Everyone is welcome and If you would like to have a place at either of the services, please contact Jane Ramsay who will ensure that the places are fairly distributed each week. - · A sides person will ensure that all hands are sanitized at the front door before entering the building. Please wait until invited into the church.
- · Masks must be worn and taken home for disposal. · Entering and leaving the building will be by the red
- ·You will be led back out of church by our sides person, this will be done from back to front of the church. Please wait to be invited to leave.
- · Hands should be sanitised when leaving church.

Our church has been deep cleaned and fogged. We will continue to "fog" on a quarterly basis as recommended by the cleaning firm who will also be professionally cleaning the church on a monthly basis for the foreseeable future. Toilets and accessibility arrangements: Level access via the side door is available for those with mobility issues. A wheelchair accessible toilet is available if required and will be sanitised after use. Working together as we have done in the past and will continue to do now as we slowly begin to re-enter a new way of coming to church, we will keep each other and those in our community safe and well until the day comes when we gather together once more in St Peter's as one large and very happy church family. NB If you have any symptoms (temperature, cough, loss of taste or smell) you should not attend church and you should book a test. And a reminder for St Peter's, that in order to avoid unexpected contacts, for the foreseeable future Jane Ramsay will be keeping a record of requests to enter the church. Please check with her beforehand to ensure that our little church will be empty and virus free before going in. Jane's number is 843176.

Pastoral visits - sadly, the new guidelines mean that pastoral visits to people's homes, including for home communion, are not possible at this time, except in extreme circumstances. Hopefully this restriction won't be for too long. And please remember that I hold you all in my prayers. Also, at this time we have been advised by the Bishop's Advisory Group that giving lifts to people, out-with your household, to church is not possible either

at this time. This is slightly different to the government guidelines, which say 'not advised'.
